



## **E-learning for End of Life Care (ELCA)**

### **Curriculum and suggested learning pathway for practitioners within primary care**

e-ELCA is the e-learning programme for end of life care. It is relevant to all health and social care staff who are involved in caring for people in the last year of life, from any disease, in any setting. This document lists all the sessions that are available in e-ELCA and guides staff in prioritising their learning. There are 4 categories:

- Basic/induction (B): these sessions provide a basic introduction to the topic. New staff should undertake these as early as possible to familiarise themselves with the area. Experienced staff confident of their own knowledge and competence in these areas may wish to move straight on to the next level.
- Essential (E): these sessions are essential learning to the staff role.
- Useful (U): though not essential, these sessions may be useful and relevant learning for these staff
- Interesting (I): staff who do not require this knowledge or skill in their area of work may, nevertheless, find the material interesting because it will help them to understand better the work that their colleagues undertake.

This is a generic guide which you may wish to use in conjunction with the list of all e-ELCA sessions and their learning objectives which is available on the e-ELCA website: <http://www.e-lfh.org.uk/programmes/end-of-life-care/>. You will need to modify the suggestions for your specific role, clinical area and personal interest.

**If you are a general practitioner or staff based within GP surgeries:** you should access e-ELCA through the e-Learning for Healthcare (e-LfH) Hub. Once you have entered the e-LfH Hub, click on 'My e-Learning'. The simplest way to access the individual session is as follows:

1. Select End of Life Care (e-ELCA)
  2. Choose the course name as shown below
  3. To open your session and start learning, select the 'Play' button. A new window will be launched containing the learning material.
- When you have completed a session, close that browser window in the normal manner.

**If you are NHS staff based in the community:** you may access e-ELCA through the e-LfH Hub or the Electronic Staff Record (ESR). Within each course (numbered in bold below), there are a varying number of e-learning sessions.
